Area

IBAS co-operation: A Minilateral approach

Rationale:

There has been a growing interest in "minilateral arrangements" (particularly, in the areas of trade and climate change negotiations) either as an alternative or as a complement to bilateral regional and multilateral arrangements. The agenda in such negotiations can be geared to the specific interests of the participants and special administrative bodies can be established to provide a consultation and dispute settlement mechanism "for members only". Minilateralism has the potential to eliminate the "free rider" problem in multilateral negotiations, and even establish more favorable conditions for multilateral agreements.
